2018 was another busy year at St Mary's. The project to restore the tower started in earnest, although the only visible progress has been the placing of security fencing around its base. This is to prevent anybody suffering from an unexpected headache owing to falling debris. There have been a number of important meetings with the many different organisations

involved in this massive project. St Mary's has now been put on the Churches at Risk register by Historic England, which will help us when we start applying for grants.

The traditional round of activities throughout the year all went well. The Music Festival was very well supported and finished with our Festal Evensong when we welcomed the Revd George Bush as our guest preacher. The Flea Market, Book Fair and Christmas Fair were all well attended.

Thank you to all who work so hard to make these events so successful. We were also very pleased to welcome the Horticultural Society back again for their annual show. Around 100 people (and the donkey) took part in the Real-Life Nativity which, because of the appalling weather, was held in the Church. We did, however, venture over the road to the Bushel and Strike for the Inn and Stable scenes.

There have been significant changes in the structure of the choir as the choir report shows. My thanks to John Rowlands and Bene't Coldstream for managing choral concerns while Judy Catterick has been unwell. The Sunday services benefit hugely from the support of an active choir. The spiritual side of the church has benefited from Lent and Advent courses and a group from the benefice enjoyed a retreat to the Isle of Wight.

We have suffered some petty losses in the church during the year, but I think it is really important that the church is kept open daily. The comments in the visitors' book and from people I meet in the church tell how much this is appreciated. My thanks go to all who support the church and its activities.

Ashwell Parish Church Choirs

2018 was a year of change for the church choir. This change was mainly a separation into junior, morning and evening choirs, although some choir members sing at both services. During the illness of the church's music director, Mrs Judy Catterick MBE, the choirs were largely directed by Bene't Coldstream and John Rowlands. Judy is now back in the choir stalls. Her presence at rehearsals and at evensong was missed and we are glad she is back. She continues to look after choral evensong and Bene't looks after the mornings and the evening services for major festivals. John is also the church organist, so his efforts in keeping the evensong choir going during Judy's absence have been extraordinary and the church is indebted to him.

Musically 2018 was an uplifting year with a sprinkling of new music. On Palm Sunday the choir juniors and adult ladies sang the first movement of Pergolesi's Stabat Mater. This piece is haunting and describes Christ's suffering on the cross. The music is a slow, high voice duet with many suspensions (dissonant notes that resolve into harmony) and, with the passionate singing of the choir, the congregation were treated to this gem. The full morning choir performed Thou knowest Lord (Purcell), Ubi Caritas (Gjielo) and two chorales from Bach's motet Jesu, Priceless Treasure. With Bene't Coldstream now running the morning choir in an official capacity, we look forward to more uplifting music in 2019.

Our evening choir had a number of high spots during the year. The home team of Bene't and John guided the choir along

the journey to the Festal Evensong, which closed the 2018 Ashwell Music Festival, most notably singing the challenging setting of the canticles by Bryan Kelly in C major. At the service for All Souls, the Fauré Requiem was sung liturgically and we sang at the Service of Lessons and Carols in December. We have recruited an organist, Andrew Henthorn, from outside the parish. He plays at evensong once a month and is a most welcome addition to our ranks.

We had a number of new recruits in the autumn. More are welcome and, if you are interested in joining one or more of our choirs, do please speak to Bene't, Judy or John. You will be made to feel very welcome.

Bellringers

During 2018 we played host to several groups of visiting ringers. In July we had a midweek visit from the Gidding ringing group – a team of ringers from the Peterborough area who are all retired. They found our bells somewhat harder to ring than those they are used to. In August the local district of the Herts County Ringing Association split their regular monthly meeting between Ashwell and Hinxworth, with ringers of all abilities ringing a variety of methods. In September our own band was joined by a group on a weekend away to ring for Sunday morning service. In addition, the Ashwell Scout Troop visited the tower in June.

We rang to celebrate four weddings during the year as well as ringing for other special occasions, such as half-muffled to mark the centenary of the ending of the First World War on Remembrance Sunday. We rang for Sunday services at least twice each month, although, as some of our ringers come from outside the village, it was not always possible to ring all six bells.

Our newer ringers continued to make progress, learning the art of ringing from the more experienced ringers who came to our practice nights from time to time. Although we lost two of our learners owing to pressure of work and family commitments, we gained two new recruits in the autumn, who are learning to ring with the support of more experienced ringers.

New ringers are always welcome, experienced or beginners. We would love to have more Ashwell people learning to ring, and we are happy to teach those who have never rung before. We practise on Thursday evenings from 8:00 pm, so, if you would like to learn to ring or just see how we do it, come along to the tower where you will be made welcome.

St Marys' Church Discoverers and Children's Activities

Tesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not stop them, because the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these."

Children are valued members of our church family and our community. Our church activities for children and young people are open to all, whether they are regular churchgoers or not. We are always pleased to see familiar faces and newcomers alike. We run an inclusive session for all ages, which lasts for about 30 minutes during the 10:45 am Sunday service. On the first Sunday each month we join in the "Thank God It's Sunday" service at 9:30 am.

During our Discoverers sessions we look for fun and creative ways to understand God's message through bible stories or seasonal activities. Subjects covered during the year have included: truth, trust, loving your neighbour, remembrance, the Holy Spirit, discipleship, talking to God, and many more. In addition to singing hymns and anthems during the services, junior choir members play an important role by joining in with our Discoverers activities. Along with other young people in the congregation, they entertain the congregation by sharing what they have learnt each week through dance, drama and artwork. Young people often join in our informal "Thank God It's Sunday" with bible readings or prayers and by helping to teach the congregation to learn new songs as part of our worship.

In 2018 we hosted two messy church sessions: in March we made gifts for Mothering Sunday, which included decorated frames with a message about love, paper bouquets and hands which represented our family. As always, we offered Easter activities for young people, including the building of the Easter garden and an egg hunt for little ones, followed by the Easter story. At Christmas our theme was the message of peace that is epitomised by the arrival of baby Jesus. We looked at verses from the popular carol "Hark the herald angels sing" to focus our craft activities and worship, culminating in the revelation of our Advent window.

Ashwell Mothers' Union

Craft classes give them an opportunity to sit with one another and make and create, to ease the time passing by. We keep in touch with Garden House Hospice and make and take cakes for the patients and their families and friends to enjoy. We have done this twice and provided over 30 cakes.

Ashwell United Reformed Church Repair and Refurbishment 2018

Service of Celebration and Thanksgiving for the recent A Service of Celebration and Thanks, vin. 102 and 1200-1200 A Repair and Refurbishment Project was conducted by Revd Jim Dalgleish on Sunday 23rd September 2018 at 3:00 pm, followed by refreshments.

Mrs Jackie Embury, church treasurer and project manager, thanked everyone who had taken an active part in making the project a success. It had been a challenging journey trying to keep the integrity of the original 1906 English Art Nouveau

plan by researching documents, uncovering layers of paint and seeking expert advice wherever possible.

The work became necessary when it was discovered that the church ceiling was in need of urgent repairs to prevent it from collapsing. Once we discovered it would be necessary to

scaffold the interior fully to carry out this work, it was decided to go for a complete refurbishment, including a kitchenette facility in one of the vestry rooms.

The estimate for this work was in the region of £53,000, an amount of money the church did not have, so the United Reformed Church Thames North Synod and Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust were approached. They both kindly agreed to make a grant towards this work, amounting to a generous total of £30,000, which meant £23,000 had to be found by the church.

An appeal went out to the village, which was well received and resulted in donations not only from villagers but also from village organisations and the North Hertfordshire District Council Community Fund, together with support in fundraising events especially helping with the Saturday afternoon teas.

Mr Paul Morris of Templars, Baldock, oversaw the project. Steve Cook of A J Cook Builders LLP, together with David Eley, Ashwell decorator, carried out the work, restoring original features in a very professional way. Refreshments were served in the hall after the service, allowing people time to look at the completed work, ask questions and to be thanked personally.
